The 65th SESCAL is next month at the Radisson LAX Hotel and should be a great show. The details of the show are described elsewhere in this issue. Please help make the members of the two host societies feel welcome. The Universal Ship Cancellation Society and The Sports Philatelists International are holding their annual membership meetings during SESCAL. The meetings schedule is available on our Web site, www.sescal.org.

Take special note of the talk "Sports Illustrated" by the noted philatelic artist Carl T. Herrman on Saturday at 1 p.m. Mr. Herrman was a USPS art director from 1992 to 2008 and designed numerous sports and other stamps. Among his stamp designs are those for World Cup Soccer, Olympic Discus, Atlanta Olympics (20) and Legendary Football Coaches. A brief biography is available on the Web site.

This year we are fortunate to have the first American Philatelic Society Educational Course to be given in Southern California. Richard Drews of Illinois will be presenting the two-day course, Exhibiting for the Prize, on Wednesday and Thursday (Oct 7-8) from 9 a.m.–5 p.m. See the APS Web site at stamps.org/education/edu_Courses.htm for details and a link to the online registration form. The sponsorship of this APS course by The Philatelic Society of Los Angeles, in memory of Toby Tobias, has resulted in a greatly reduced registration cost of \$25 for APS members and \$50 for non-members. Preregistration is a must due to the limited capacity of the course.

Congratulations to the Ries Chapter of American FDC Society, which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. It has always been a big supporter of SESCAL and it is handling the show cachet and cancellation. The 2009 cachet has been designed by the cachet-making legend Bernard Goldberg. A hearty thanks goes to all its members for their work at SESCAL.

Due to construction issues, the parking structure at the Radisson will not be completed by SESCAL. Be sure to check www.sescal.org for the final details of approved parking. Do NOT fail to have your parking ticket validated. Validated tickets at the approved parking will receive a significant savings.

Our appreciation cannot be sufficiently expressed to the volunteers who have helped make possible the Federation and SESCAL. The past secretary, Lois Evans, has taken over the task of Federation and SESCAL treasurer following the excellent job Joan Hastings has done for the past four years.

Sadly, due to the lack of a VENPEX bourse chairman and general chairman, there will not be a VENPEX in 2009 and likely not in 2010. The good news is that the Ventura County Philatelic Society will hold its annual free Youth Stamp Fair

on Saturday, Oct. 17, 2009, at the Dudley House, Ashwood and Loma Vista, Ventura. This great how-to-collect event is for kids and any interested adults. There are lots of free stamps, a cachet contest, and GeoSafari games. The VCPS volunteers have been doing a great job, and this is a fun event for all. POWPEX 2009 will be held the weekend of Nov. 14-15, 2009. The hours are 10 a.m.-6 p.m. on Saturday and 10 a.m.-4 p.m. on Sunday at the Al Bahr Shrine Center, 5440 Kearny Mesa Road, San Diego, CA 92111. The show theme is What's In Your Attic, and attendees are encouraged to take their collections and accumulations to POWPEX for a free valuation. About 20 professional dealers and the United States Postal Service will be at the show to entice collectors to part with their \$. A special show cachet and cancellation will be available. The San Diego Philatelic Library will have a table where attendees can learn about the great resources available in the San Diego area. SANDICAL 2010 will be held Jan. 15-17, the third weekend of the month, at the Al Bahr Shrine Center, 5440 Kearny Mesa Road., San Diego. The hours of the show are 10 a.m.–6 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and 10 a.m.–4 p.m. on Sunday. The show theme is Marketplace of History: A Tribute to Our Dealers. Every dealer present will be honored for their support of SANDICAL. There will be outstanding philatelic exhibits and a 26-dealer bourse. We are searching for a new SESCAL general chairman to see that SESCAL has a future. Wallace will retire immediately after SESCAL. Without a chairman, the 65th SESCAL will be the last SESCAL.

Cost is \$35 per person, and reservations may be made through the Postal History


Foundation at phf3@mindspring.com, or phone 520-623-6652. Special dietary requests must be made with reservations, and payment must be received by Oct. 5.

Some useful Web sites for collectors

The Internet has created a new world for stamp collectors and other hobbyists by providing new places to buy, sell and share their hobbies.

Thousand of Web sites — prepared by everyone from individuals to large organizations — feature stamp collecting in its many aspects.

Auction houses post their lots so they can be reviewed and bid on without ever being at the auctioneer's office or auction site.

Clubs, from the smallest community group to the largest international organizations, have Web sites for their members and for people who want to learn more about them.

There are so many stamp collecting sites, that there are even directories of Web sites. This list contains some of the editor's favorites.

SESCAL

At www.sescal.org, the site contains information about the annual show, of course, along with links to the Federated Philatelic Clubs of Southern California site, which, in turn, features a list of all member clubs and their meeting times and locations, mailing addresses and links to their Web sites, if any.

American Philatelic Society

The site at www.stamps.org includes many links for new collectors and a se-

ries of pages for young collectors, not to mention information about the APS and its entire online stamp store and a number of free stamp albums.

Virtual Stamp Club

The Web site, which can be found at www.virtualstampclub.com, is run by Lloyd A. de Vries, who, with a staff of correspondents and e-mail writers, keeps his visitors updated with all the news of the stamp world. His forums include sections on everything from the U.S. U.S. stamp program to problem listings on eBay, along with lots of information for new collectors.

The Collectors Club of Chicago

Members of the club answer questions from everyone from beginners to advanced collectors at www.askphil.org. The site also contains the Salm Foundation Reports, a reference library and more.

Joseph Luft's Philatelic Resources on the Web

The name tell it all. The site at luftfamily.com/cgi-bin/newadditions.cgi includes more than 4,000 links to stamp collecting sites on the Web. The topics include New Additions, General Resources, Shows and Societies, Postal Authorities, Country Specific,

Downloadable Images, Collectors Pages, Commercial Offerings, Software and Auctions.

PhilaGuide: The Golden Guide for Philatelists

The site at www.philaguide.com contains multilingual guides to stamp collecting terms, lists of societies and more.

What are you doing for National Stamp Collecting Month?

Every year since 1981, October has been National Stamp Collecting Month. Other than attending SESCAL what are you and your club doing to promote the hobby?

National Stamp Collecting Month began in 1981 and was put together by the Council of Philatelic Organizations and the United States Postal Service. The council is no longer active, leaving the USPS and individual organizations to carry on the promotion of stamp collecting.

National groups can do national promotion, but it takes local collectors, and, with any luck, their clubs, to promote

our favorite hobby. Doing that involves two stages: introducing people (children or adults) to the hobby and helping them continue once they get interested.

Starting people is certainly the easier of the two. The Ventura County Philatelic Society, for instance, has a booth at the county fair each year to distribute free stamps and sponsors a Youth Stamp Fair to show collecting techniques and give away more stamps.

The hard part is keeping people interested. The VCPS meets on Monday night, which effectively rules out regular attendance by elementary and middle school students, the most likely candi-

dates for the two introductory events. Ventura County is fortunate in having two stamps stores — on in each end of the county — but we all recognize that it's difficult for children to visit them. The days are long gone when every town of any size had a stamp dealer, or at least a department store that had packets and some introductory albums available.

What can we do?

Ideas are welcome, but even if you don't want to share them with other clubs, at least take them to your own club to encourage some action. We need more collectors.

2010 U.S. stamp program includes cowboys, comic strips

The tentative 2010 schedule for U.S. stamp subjects includes Katharine Hepburn, Roy Rogers, Kate Smith, Garfield the cat and more comic strips.

The schedule was announced Aug. 6 at a meeting of Postal Service officials and journalists at the American Philatelic Society Stampshow in Pittsburgh and was reported by Linn's Stamp News.

Here's what to look for, so far (all dates are tentative, and face values will depend on postage rates):

Jan. 1: 44-cent Year of the Tiger commemorative and souvenir sheet.

January: 44-cent Olympic Winter Games commemorative.

January: Mackinac Bridge in Michigan single Priority Mail stamp.

January: Bixby Creek Bridge in California on Express Mail.

February: Four 44-cent Distinguished Sailors commemoratives (William S. Sims, Arleigh A. Burke, John McCloy and Doris Miller), Washington, D.C.

April: Poet Julia de Burgos commemorative (Literary Arts series), Cleveland, Ohio.

April: Four American Flag stamps showing the flag in four seasons.

April: 10 stamps (five cats and five dogs) titled Animal Rescue: Adopt a Shelter Pet in booklet form, New Milford, Conn.

April: Love stamp (purple pansies in a basket).

May: Katharine Hepburn commemorative (Legends of Hollywood), Old Saybrook, Conn.

June: Kate Smith commemorative, Lake Placid, N.Y.

June: Oscar Micheaux commemorative (Black Heritage), Gregory, S.D.

June: Fourth set of 10 Flags of Our Nations coils.

June: Two Negro League Baseball stamps, Kansas City, Mo.

July: Five Sunday Funnies commemorative ("Archie," "Beetle Bailey," "Dennis the Menace," "Garfield" and "Calvin and Hobbes").

July: Four Cowboys of the Silver Screen commemoratives (William S. Hart, Tom Mix, Gene Autry and Roy Rogers), Oklahoma City, Okla.

Aug. 12: Winslow Homer commemorative showing a portion of the painting "Boys in a Field" (American Treasures), Richmond, Va.

September: 10 stamps featuring abstract expressionists (Hans Hofmann's "The Golden Wall," Adolph Gottlieb's "Romanesque Facade," Mark Rothko's "Orange and Yellow," Arshile Gorky's "The Liver is the Cock's Comb," Clyfford Still's "1948-C," Willem de Kooning's "Asheville," Barnett Newman's "Achilles," Jackson Pollock's "Convergence," Robert Motherwell's "Elegy to the Spanish Republic No. 34" and Joan Mitchell's "La Grande Vallee 0"), Buffalo, N.Y.

October: 10 Hawaiian rain forest commemoratives (Nature of America), Hilo, Hawaii.

October: Four Holiday Evergreens (ponderosa pine, eastern red cedar, blue spruce and balsam fir) Christmas stamps, New York, N.Y.

October: Madonna and Child Christmas stamp (a detail of Madonna of the Candelabra by Raphael), New York, N.Y.

Possible:

July: 100th anniversary of Boy Scouts of America commemorative.
